CHANGES in the MASS Pt3

How have you dealt with new translation of the Mass? My guess is with some difficulty and awkwardness. This installment explains the changes in the *Mystery of Faith* after the consecration. The next installment will cover the *Invitation to Communion*.

In the new Mass translation, after the consecration, the Priest announces, “*The mystery of faith*”. This is a declarative statement about the Eucharist now present. Blessed John Paul II reflected on these words in his Encyclical, *Ecclesia de Eucharistia*, writing that *the very thought of the mysterious gift of the Holy Eucharist should fill us with “profound amazement and gratitude”* (no. 5).

At first glance, we notice the absent of the popular acclamation, “*Christ has died, Christ is risen, Christ will come again.*” There are three reasons for not including this acclamation in the new translation. One, the Latin edition of the **ROMAN MISSAL** does not contain this acclamation. More importantly, it is more a proclamation of our faith, which is part of the Creed, rather than an acclamation of Christ made present in the Eucharist. It also does not speak of our relationship with Him, of our sharing in the Eucharist and of our awaiting of the Eucharistic fulfillment in Heavenly banquet. The three revised acclamations have familiar phrases from the old translation, but rearranged. The new translation tries to show the connection between Christ’s death and His resurrection. Further, this translation expresses the way we proclaim the Christ event until He comes again. All acclamations have their roots in Scripture. Option A, and especially option B, derive from 1Corinthians 11:26: “*For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the death of the Lord until he comes.*” Christ’s title in Option C comes from John 4:42, “*we know that this is truly the savior of the world,*” which is the response by the Samaritans to the woman who met Jesus at the well.

Option A has the most extensive revisions in order to shift the emphasis more upon Christ’s own death and Resurrection. The old translation acclaimed, “*Dying you destroyed our death, rising you restored our life. Lord Jesus, come in glory.*” The new translation acclaims, “*We proclaim your death, O Lord, and profess your resurrection until you come again.*”

Option B remains the same with two minor changes in order to adhere closer to the Latin edition. The “*Lord Jesus*” changes to “*O Lord*”. The “*in glory*” becomes “*again*”. For Option C, the new translation places at the beginning and reworks “*Save us Savior of the world for*”.
