Saint for December, Peter Canisius, Priest and Doctor (1521-1597), December 21

The energetic life of Peter Canisius should demolish any stereotypes we may have of the life of a saint as dull or routine. Peter lived his 76 years at a pace which must be considered heroic, even in our time of rapid change. A man blessed with many talents, Peter is an excellent example of the scriptural man who develops his talents for the sake of the Lord's work.

He was one of the most important figures in the Catholic Reformation in Germany. His was such a key role that he has often been called the "second apostle of Germany" in that his life parallels the earlier work of Boniface (June 5).

Although Peter once accused himself of idleness in his youth, he could not have been idle for too long, for at the age of nineteen he received a master's degree in from the University of Cologne. Soon afterward he met Peter Faber, the first disciple of Ignatius Loyola (July 31), who influenced Peter so much that he joined the recently formed Society of Jesus.

At this early age Peter had already taken up a practice he continued throughout his life-a process of study, reflection, prayer, and writing. After his ordination in 1546, He became widely known for his editions of the writings of St. Cyril of Alexandria (June 27) and St. Leo the Great (November 10). Besides this reflective literary bent, Peter had a zeal for the apostolate. He

could often be found visiting the sick, or prisoners, even when his assigned duties in other areas were more that enough to keep most people fully occupied.

In 1547 Peter attended several sessions of the Council of Trent, whose decrees he was later assigned to implement. After a brief teaching assignment at the Jesuit college at Messina, Peter was entrusted with the mission to Germany- from that point on his life's work. He taught in several universities and was instrumental in establishing many colleges and seminaries. He wrote a catechism that explained the Catholic faith in a way that common people could understand-a great need of that age.

Renowned as a popular preacher, Peter packed churches with those eager to hear his eloquent proclamation of the Gospel. He had great diplomatic ability, often serving as a reconciler between disputing faction. In his letters (filling eight volumes), one find words of wisdom and counsel to people in all walks of life. At times he wrote unprecedented letters of criticism to leader of the Church=yet always in the context of a loving, sympathetic concern.

At seventy Peter suffered a paralytic seizure; but he continued to preach and write with the aid of secretary until his death in his hometown (Nijmegten, the Netherlands) on December 21, 1597.

Saint for January: Vincent, Deacon and Martyr (d.304), January 22

When Jesus deliberately began his journey to death, Luke says that he "set his face" to go to Jerusalem. It is this quality of rocklike courage that distinguishes the martyrs.

Most of what we know about this saint comes from the poet Prudentius. His Acts have been rather freely colored by the imagination of their of their compiler. But St. Augustine, in one of his sermons on St. Vincent, speaks of having the Acts of his martyrdom before him. We are at least sure of his name, his being a deacon, and the place of his death and burial.

According to the story we have (and as with some of the other early martyrs the unusual devotion he inspired must have had a basis in a very heroic life), Vincent was ordained a deacon by his friend St. Valerius of Zaragossa in Spain. The Roman emperors had published their edicts against the clergy in 303, and the following year against the laity. Vincent and his bishop were imprisoned in Valencia. Hunger and torture failed to break them. Like the youths in the fiery furnace (Daniel 3), they seemed to thrive on suffering.

Valerius was sent into exile, and Dacian, the Roman governor, now turned the full force of his fury on Vincent. Tortures that sound very modern were tried. But their main effect was the progressive disintegration of Dacian himself. He had the torturers beaten because they failed.

Finally he suggested a compromise. Would Vincent give up the sacred books to be burned according to the emperor's edict. He would not. Torture on the gridiron continued, the prisoner remaining courageous, the torturer losing control of himself. Vincent was thrown into a filthy prison cell---and converted the jailer. Dacian wept with rage but, strangely enough, ordered the prisoner to be given some rest.

Friends among the faithful that came to visit him, but he was to have no earthly rest. When they finally settled him on a comfortable bed, he went to his Eternal rest.
