We begin the month of October still reeling from the terrible events in New York, Washington and Pennsylvania. Its almost impossible to comprehend the violence of these terrible deeds and the suffering and death of so many innocent people. The First Sunday of October is traditionally Respect Life Sunday, a time when the U.S. Bishops invite us to focus on God's gift of life from conception to natural death. As Catholics we are called to a Gospel of life and to cherish and respect God's gift of life and each other. The Frst Reading for Respect Life Sunday this year is from the prophet Habakkuk and a very appropriate Reading for us right now. The prophet confronts violence in his own day as we do so much in our time and cries out: "How long, O Lord? I cry for help but you do not listen!....Destruction and violence are before me". We can cry out on Respect Life Sunday also: "How long, O Lord, until as a nation we cherish and respect the life of the innocent, unborn child and the life of the old, the sick and the severely handicapped? How long until he end of the violence of the extremists who took so many innocent lives in New York, Wshington and When will there be a change of Pennsylvania? heart? When will each and everyone seek peace and justice and an end to death, iolence and war? God's response to Habakkuk and to us: "Hold fast to the vision of faith, hope and love – the vision will have its fulfillment. Do not lose heart". Financial Secretary's Report 16 Aug 2001 — 15 Sept 2001



The council recorded expenses of \$1,123.12 and income of \$1,637.00 during the Aug 16, 2001 through Sept 15, 2001 period. In addition to normal expenses for pantry supplies, copying. and meeting office refreshments, the 10 expense items included \$154.42 for the July bulletin and copies of the membership roster, \$673.10 for the Labor Day picnic, \$112.12 for supplies for the July and August parish breakfasts, and \$100 to Catholic Charities. The income included \$517 from the August 26th parish breakfast, \$1,060 from the Labor Day picnic and \$60 in member payments.

The council lost one member this period when Brother Thomas Trautt took a Withdrawal card. and gained a member on August 22nd when John Giordano received his first degree membership.

Vocations Are Everybody's Business

With the recent media blitz involving stem cell research, many of us have been expected to have an opinion without a minimum knowledge of the subject. Because our Church really does shepherd her flock, she was ready to make a stand against embryonic stem cell research as soon as comments were made public. Please not that the Church is **NOT** against stem cell research using adult stem cells.

The Catholic Church had stated many years ago that it was morally incorrect to have in-vitro fertilization (ICF). This process consists in collecting sperm and ovum, which create embryos in a petri dish or a test tube. These embryos are later implanted in a woman's womb to aid infertility. Due to the fact that multiple implantations are required to obtain a successful pregnancy, clinics save more fertilized eggs than needed. Because this practice has become widespread, we are now faced with a large number of these embryos living outside of the human womb in a research lab. The Church has stated that these embryos have life and must now be allowed to die a natural death.

Stem cell are certain cells that have the ability to divide for indefinite periods in a culture (petri dish) and to give rise to specialized cells. Our bodies have an ample supply of human stem cell that can be used for research without destroying life to obtain them. These cells are found in our bone marrow, fat cells, and umbilical cords to name but a few. First reported in 1998, adult stem cells have received comparatively little interest for research mainly due to the fact that lengthy and careful studies are needed in their use.

Another reason for using adult stem cells rather than embryonic cells has to do with "tissue match". For a patient to be treated, he must have the stem cells that will be a "tissue match" which his body will accept. If embryonic stem cells are used there must be a "tissue match" with the patient receiving them. The envisioned process in adult stem cell research would use the patient's own stem cells for their cure which would eliminate the need for this "matching" process.

Finally, science is meant to serve humanity. Science is not a religion that humanity serves. Those who work in medical research have been given a gift from God, Our Creator. A gift is meant to be used responsibly to serve God's people both ethically and morally. The Catholic Church looks at the "Big Picture" rather than on the short-sightedness of the world as to how decisions will affect mankind. I appeal to my fellow Knights to favor and to educate others in the area of adult stem cell research as the preferred direction in which to proceed.
