





Clergy of the Month



Daughters of Charity



Founded in 1633 by St. Vincent de Paul, Venerable Sister Loise de Marillac in France. Named Daughters of Charity rather than Sisters because at that time all Orders of Women Religious had to be cloistered. St. Vincent de Paul wanted these sisters to spend their time nursing the sick in their homes and the streets, having no monastery but the homes of the sick, their cell a hired room, their chapel the parish church, their enclosure the streets of the city or wards of the hospital. At first the group was formed as a confraternity among the people of his parish. Little did they imagine the vast structure they were founding. Soon the order was involved in educating children of the poor, running hospitals and asylums, and caring for orphans. At the request of the Queen of Poland, sisters came to minister on the field of battle. This is a ministry often given by them since, and has secured for them the title of "Angels of the Battlefield".

At the very beginning of the French Reign of Terror, the motherhouse of the sisters was invaded by the revolutionists, but the sight of this band of angels of mercy on their knees in the chapel moved their assailants to leave them unmolested. Persecution drove them from many of their works of mercy in France, but this gave hundreds of new laborers to the foreign missions. The growth of the order has been extraordinary to the corners of the earth. In the East they are called "The Swallows of Allah" from their cornettes. Seven sisters were martyred during the French Revolution, and ten laid down their lives for the Faith in 1870 in China. The Daughters of Charity is now the largest order of religious women with 25,000 members in 75 countries.

The members of the order take their vows of poverty, chastity, obedience and service to the poor annually. No office is recited, for "Charity is your office", said St. Vincent. Their traditional dress is that of peasant women of the Paris area, but this has been superseded by a simpler, modern habit in most areas.

Mother Ann Seton, in America, organized the Sisters of Charity in 1809 under the rule of St. Vincent de Paul. After her death her successor combined some of the Sisters of Charity with the Daughters of Charity. The Daughters of Charity schools were the forerunners of the parochial school system in the United States. The Daughters of Charity first came to Santa Barbara in 1858 and have provided education and care for children. They opened the first day care center in California here in 1917 on De La Vina St., which operated for 60 years. At their current location on Calle Real since 1863, they have operated a day school, residential school, an orphanage, and a home for developmentally disabled girls. At this time, they provide day care and run a transitional housing and social services program for struggling single mothers and their children. This is a unique and successful program which includes completion of education and employment to learn usable skills. There are 5 Daughters of Charity ministering in Santa Barbara at this time.

Also please continue to pray for the soul of Angie Scanlon, Leo Stark, and Ernestine Sanchez.



Financial Secretary's Report 16 March– 15 April 2003



The council recorded expenses of \$4,202.40 and income of \$4,055.00 during the March 16, 2003 through April 15, 2003 period. In addition to normal expenses for office supplies, copying, and meeting refreshments, the 18 expense items included \$1,851.61 for Lenten fish fry supplies (including \$538.56 for fish); \$740.10 for insurance and the first half of the rent for the Fiesta Coke booth; \$500 to St. Marks for the spring retreat; \$240 to the youth group for assistance at the fish fries; \$163.44 to Supreme for Catholic advertising (\$62.50) and supplies; \$160.55 for the printing of the March bulletin; \$150 bulk mail advance for mailing the bulletin; and \$100 to Catholic Charities.

Income consisted of \$3,619 from the fish fries during this period, \$251 from the 30 March breakfast, and \$185.50 in member payments.

The council lost one member with the passing of PGK Walt Dudziak on 9 April. Membership currently is 199.

The attendance prize went unclaimed at the April business meeting. The May business meeting's attendance prize will be \$65.


The month of May is traditionally devoted to Mary, Our Mother. Please consider praying a daily Rosary with your family.



Be it abortion, euthanasia, or the death penalty, a Christian and especially a Catholic Christian is called to live Christ-like and to choose Life.




- Ed Carroll passed away April 2, 2003. Born 97 years ago on a small farm in southern Minnesota, T Edmund spent his early years attending a distant 1-room schoolhouse along with his 5 brothers and sisters. Studying was with the help of a kerosene lamp and no inside plumbing; he endured, but often commented on those cold winter walks "outside". But with self-confidence and much discipline, he left quite a legacy.
- In September of 1928, Ed married Fern Roberts of Owatonna, Minnesota, and began a lifelong career there with Jostens, manufacturer of scholastic jewelry. Several years later he was honored to serve as Mayor of Owatonna.
- Ed and Fern moved to California in 1959 where Ed retired in 1984 from his 55-year career in sales, promotion, personnel and service with Jostens in Summerland. By then Ed and Fern were enjoying their residency at Encina Royale where Ed spent many hours playing golf with the "Nooners" on the Royale 9-hole course. He was quick to point out that during his 38 years there, he had over 300 holes in one. Ed will always be remembered for his consummate Irish humor and dry wit. He was also an avid reader, gin, cribbage and bridge player. Additionally, Ed was always involved in politics and was an active Democrat since 1928. He was a Democrat delegate to the state convention in Minnesota for a number of years.
- His passion for the Knights of Columbus was well known where he had spent 79 years as a Knight at the time of his death. As the Grand Knight back in his hometown of Owatonna, Minnesota, he often remarked about meeting the returning World War II veterans at the bus station to hand them an application form for the Columbian Squires. While not as active in Knights of Columbus in Goleta, he felt proud to be selected as Knight of the Year in 1995-96.
- Fern, his wife of 53 years died in 1981. He is survived by his daughter, Pat Carroll King of Rowland Heights; his son, Tom E Carroll of Goleta; four granddaughters, Lisa Bagot of St Louis, Missouri, Michelle Saleh of Goleta, Julie Carroll of Tjunga, Kimberly Lynch of Escondido; son-in-law, Dan Lynch of Escondido; five great grandchildren, Jacob, Rachel and Hannah Bagot, and Sameer and Renee Saleh; and his brother, Arthur Carroll of Faribault, Minnesota.
- Interment is at Santa Barbara Cemetery.

Walter Francis Dudziak



- Walt Dudziak died at home on April 9, 2003. Dr Dudziak was born in Adams, Massachusetts on January 7, 1923. The son of Polish immigrants, Michael and Mary Dudziak, he was the first in his family to attend college. He graduated from Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute.
- Dr Dudziak served in the Army during World War II, and was sent to Oakridge, Tennessee to work on the Manhattan project. He then earned his PhD in Physics at the University of California, Berkeley.
- An avid dancer, Dr Dudziak met his former wife, Barbara Dudziak, in Berkeley while dancing. The couple had four children: Diane Salerno of Littleton, CO; Mary Dudziak of Santa Monica, CA; Dan Dudziak of Jackson Hole, WY; and Suzanne Dudziak of Seattle, WA. Dr Dudziak is also survived by his brother Ed Dudziak of Adams, Massachusetts, and by seven grandchildren. Dr Dudziak took great pride in his children, who went on to become a neuropsychologist, a professor of law, a radio electronics expert and a hydrogeologist.
- The Dudziak family moved to Santa Barbara in 1958. A specialist in nuclear physics, Dr Dudziak taught in the Physics Department at UC Santa Barbara before joining the staff of General Electric Tempo in the early 1960s. He worked in the area of nuclear defense for over forty years, eventually as president of Information Science, Inc. He frequently conducted research at the US weapons lab at Los Alamos, New Mexico. He was honored for this work with a lifetime achievement award from the US Department of Defense.
- In later years, Dr Dudziak could often be seen walking his dog Ryan at Goleta Beach. Another passion was bowling, and he bowled for over thirty years with long-time friends Andy and Joanne Anderson, most recently in the Guys and Dolls League. He was recently elected to a second term on the Board of Directors of the Santa Barbara Bowling Association. He was active in St. Raphael's Church in Goleta, and had served as Faithful Navigator and Grand Knight of the Knights of Columbus. He was also a member of the Elks. The day before his unexpected death, Dr. Dudziak could be found bowling with the Andersons.




